Elizabeth starring Cate Blanchett belongs to a long line of movies about Queen Elizabeth I of England. In portraying the Virgin Queen, Blanchett joins a succession of actresses including Bette Davis, Glenda Jackson, and Helen Mirren. To prepare for viewing this film, you might want to look at the Wikipedia article on the film *Elizabeth*. The article includes a list of some of the film's historical inaccuracies.

As you study this film, you should research and answer the questions below. They will help you write your compare-and-contrast paper. You will also find that the *Oxford Dictionary of National Biography* and the *Historical Dictionary of Tudor England* will help you with your background research.

- 1. Was Cate Blanchett good casting in terms of her physical resemblance to Elizabeth Tudor?
- **2.** Do Cate Blanchett and the film's script present an accurate portrayal of Elizabeth's personality and character?
- **3.** Is the film accurate in its portrayal of the relationship between Elizabeth and Robert Dudley, both in terms of its spirit and its details?
- **4.** The film begins in 1554. How does it present the sequence of events after that point? Are events shown in proper order? Are there anachronisms?
- **5.** How does the film portray Robert Dudley and his role in Elizabethan politics?
- **6.** How does the film portray William Cecil and his role in the Elizabethan government?
- **7.** How does the film portray Thomas Howard, the Duke of Norfolk, and his role in Elizabethan politics?
- **8.** How does the film portray Sir Francis Walsingham and his role in the Elizabethan government?
- **9.** Was there a priest/assassin named Robert Ballard (aka Daniel Craig/James Bond)?
- **10.** Does the film portray the passage of the Act of Uniformity accurately?

- **11**. Does the film portray the courtship of Elizabeth and the Duke of Anjou accurately and in proper chronological order?
- **12.** Does the film portray the issuing of the papal bull *Regnan in Excelsis* accurately and in correct chronological order?
- **13.** How does the film portray the end of the Duke of Norfolk and how does that portrayal agree with historical events?
- 14. Thanks to advice from Walsingham, how does Elizabeth decide to rule England?

The end of the film states that:

Walsingham was her most trusted advisor to the end of her reign.

Elizabeth never spoke to Dudley again in private.

Elizabeth whispered Dudley's name on her deathbed.
