Types of Behavioral Problems

• Nonproblem

- o Brief inattention
- o Small talk
- o 'woolgathering'

• Minor problem

- o Calling out
- Leaving seat without permission
- o Doing unrelated work
- o Passing notes
- o Eating
- o Scattering trash
- o Talking excessively

• Major problem

- Chronically off task student
- o Student who rarely completes assignments
- Refusal to do work
- o Cheating
- o Vandalism

• Escalating/Spreading Problem

- Repeated violation of classroom rules by numerous students
- Unabated talking/socializing
- o Talking-back
- o Non-cooperation

Interventions

- Minor interventions
 - o Get the activity moving
 - o Redirect the behavior
 - o Use proximity
 - o Use non-verbal clues
 - o Use group focus

- Minor interventions (continued)
 - o Provide needed instruction
 - o Issue a brief desist
 - Give the students a choice
 - Use an "I-message" (see pg. 177 in the book)

• Moderate Interventions

- Withhold a privilege or desired activity
- Isolate or remove the student
- Assign detention
- Use a fine or penalty
- Use a school-based consequence

• More extensive interventions

- Hold a conference with the parent or guardian
- Design an individual contract with the student (see appendix A)
- Use a check or demerit system
- o Use problem-solving
- Use a 5-step intervention procedure (see pg. 184 in the book)
- Use the "Think-Time" strategy (see pg. 186 in the book)
- Use the Reality-Therapy Model (see pg. 187 in the book)
- o Use peer mediation

Special Problems

These will most likely result in a referral to the Principal

- Chronic avoidance of work
- Fighting
- Other aggressive behavior
- Bullying
- Disrespect, defiance, or hostility toward the teacher
