Dr. Angela completed her Doctor of Philosophy degree in Educational Psychology and Research from The University of Memphis. She is a PreK-12 licensed school administrator through the Tennessee Department of Education and has completed training as a life coach through Coaching for Results Global.

While in K-12 education, she served as founding principal of two independent schools and as a consultant for public charter school design. For many years, she was also an administrator in higher education. In addition, she has been a faculty member in several states and abroad.

Now as an Associate Professor of Leadership Studies at the University of Central Arkansas, she teaches and explores self-reflection, inclusiveness, and diversity in school leadership, in teaching and learning, and in individual success. Another stream of her scholarship includes the legendary dream of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. As a child, she was present for Dr. King's final speech in Memphis, Tennessee. She has not only conducted studies on his dream but she has authored a children's book "In the Presence of a King." Dr. Angela speaks internationally and has authored newsletters, journal articles, book chapters, and books. She is passionate about igniting hope-based schooling for all learners and cultivating reflective living in individuals.

Dr. Angela serves on the board of trustees of a charter school and as an executive coach with public school principals. She is active on the campus of the University of Central Arkansas, in the Association of Teacher Educators, the National Council of Professors of Educational Administration, and the University Council of Educational Administration.

She is married to Champ, and they reside in Maumelle. They have adult children and grandchildren.

Program Description:

Her session will encourage the audience to practice reflective living for the purposes of continuous improvement in multiculturalism and social justice leadership. A model of self-reflection will be presented that entails the examination of the heart, thoughts, emotions, dispositions, words, actions, habits, and character. Considerations and steps for change also will be highlighted. All of the aforementioned will promote positive ways to enhance leadership that courageously advance multiculturalism and social justice by *stepping out (stretching)*, *stumbling (steadfastness to slipping up)*, and *stepping out again (springing back and up)* to cultivate thriving classrooms, meaningful conversations, and productive communities.

Publishing Tips in Multicultural Education

Feature:

- 1. **Vocabulary**: terminology and language that are referenced, current, clearly defined, specific, and consistent
- 2. **Problems**: precise, contemporary, relevant, transferable
- 3. **Methods**: case studies, descriptive, historical, narrative inquiry, mixed
- 4. **Data**: quantitative, qualitative, and "connective"
- 5. **Conceptual Framework**: overarching big idea to guide the research, valuable findings, and insightful recommendations
- 6. **Context**: situation, setting, perspectives, parameters, limitations (what it is and what it is not)
- **7. References**: seminal, influential, theoretical, practical, recent

Annual Editions: Multicultural Education

1. Submit previously published articles electronically to the editor; AE: ME is published every 18 months

Articles must be

- 2. less than five years old and less than 15 pages in length
- 3. present contemporary topics, issues, problems, concerns
- 4. appeal to undergraduate teacher candidates and graduate students across fields of education, psychology, and sociology
- 5. balance quantitative, qualitative, and "connective" data
- 6. offer practical recommendations supported with theory and research
